Henry Parrett of Shenandoah County, Virginia Soldier in the American Revolution

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The story that Henry Parrett of Shenandoah County, Virginia served in the American Revolution has been passed down through generations of his descendants. However, finding documents to back up the story has been difficult. In *A History of Shenandoah County, Virginia*, written in 1927, the author John Wayland recalled his mother saying that she had attended a couple of the funerals of old men who had fought in the War of Independence; she had distinct memories of the honor guard and their gun salutes to these Revolutionary War veterans. Wayland had found a tombstone in an old graveyard with the statement, "He was a Soldier in the Revolution of 1776." Wayland decried the fact that there was little written about those who served. He observed, "These bits of fact and incident are typical of our knowledge of that stirring period. A little here and a little there is recorded or remembered, but most of the thrilling details of that momentous time are lost beyond recall." (Wayland, 194)

So it is with Henry Parrett. The fact that he was a soldier in the war has been mentioned in family letters and family histories. His name was recorded on a few lists that have found their way into books and archives, but no official record, no details of his service have survived. What has been gathered in support of the belief that he was in the American Revolution is presented here. Note that Henry's name was spelled variously as Parrett, Parrott, and Paret in the various records and notations.

Henry Parrott also appears in the *Historical Register of Virginians in the Revolution* on page 606. Downloaded from Ancerstry.com on November 19, 2014.

In his book published in 1927, the author John Wayland wrote, "In a manuscript volume called the 'Romney and Winchester Pay Roll,' pages 29 and 30, is a list of the men in Captain John Tipton's company who were in the service early in the Revolution. John Tipton was a very prominent citizen of Shenandoah County; and it is possible that most of his men were from the same county. The author is indebted to the manuscript collections of Hon. Bontwell Dunlap of San Francisco for a copy of Captain John Tipton's Roll." Included in this list of 50 men is Henry Parrott, as well as George and Samuel Parrott. The men were paid on October 25, 1775 for terms of services from 22-158 days. (Source: Wayland, John Walter. A History of Shenandoah Co, Virginia. Strasburg, VA: Shenandoah Pub. In a letter Ella Cottingham of Noblesville, Indiana wrote to Laura Hoover in Gibson City, IL on April 22, 1913, she writes, "Grandma often told me her grandfather [Henry] Parrot was in the Revolutionary War under George Washington -- her mother's father. That would be our great, great, great [grand]father wouldn't it?" (Source: A copy of the letter is in the possession of Susan McNelley). Henry Parrett was a G-G-G grandfather of Laura Ellen Hoover.

The following excerpt on a descendant of Frederick Jr. who moved to Ross County, OH provides information on Frederick, the immigrant ancestor. "The American ancestor of [George C. Parrett] was a native of Switzerland. From the best available information it is found he came to America in 1730 locating in Virginia, where he spent the rest of his life. Five of his sons were soldiers in the Revolutionary War. " (Evans, Lyle D. A Standard History of Ross Co, Ohio. Vol. II, Chicago: Lewis Pub Co, 1917, Digitized by Google. p 819.)

In her book on the descendants of Frederick Parrett, Dawn writes, "Frederick's seven sons were among those who heeded [the call to revolution]. It appears that Henry, Jacob, George, and Joseph, whose ages ranged from thirty-four to sixteen, enlisted in Muhlenberg's Eighth Regiment at the Suffolk County Courthouse in the spring of 1776 when the bulk of the troops were organized. . . . Eldest son, thirty-seven-year old John, signed on in 1777. John served with Virginia's Sixteenth Regiment, commanded by Colonel William Grayson. Samuel was drafted in 1781. . . . Frederick Jr., the youngest, enlisted in 1781, at seventeen." Dawn notes that Muhlenberg's Eighth Regiment was known as the German Regiment, assembled to comply with an ordinance of the Virginia colony in 1775 calling for the creation of a German regiment to be made up of German officers and soldiers. Memoir Mentor Books, 2014) Unfortunately, Henry's name does not appear in the U.S. Revolutionary War Rolls for Muhlenberg's Eighth Regiment (accessed at Ancestry.com in November 2014), although his brothers Joseph, Jacob, and George do.

As of this writing, we must be content with less than we might hope for in the way of evidence of Henry's Revolutionary War Service.


